Understand simple questions about 'who', 'what' and 'where' (but generally not Play with one or more other children, extending and elaborating play ideas 'why'). Be increasingly independent as they get dressed and Enjoy listening to longer stories and can remember much of what happens. Activities undressed, for example, putting coats on and doing up zips. Understand a question or instruction that has two parts, such as "Get your coat Draw lines & circles to represent baubles & tinsel on Christmas tree and wait at the door". Cut out Christmas cards & Christmas toys from catalogues Sing a large repertoire of songs. Activities Write name on Christmas card. Start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns. Act out a birthday party in role play area Make cakes stirring ingredients & spreading the icing. Activities Perform Christmas songs. Make Christmas biscuits using cutters Role play a birthday party. Play party games, join in dancing. Make tea light pots using clay Read Christmas stories & join in repeated refrains Get ready into Nativity costumes. Take part in 'Wiggle while you Squiggle' Retell the Nativity story.

 Notice some print, such as the first letter of their name, a bus or door number, or a familiar logo. Enjoy drawing freely. Add some marks to their drawings, which they give meaning to. For example: "That says mummy." Make marks on their picture to stand for their name. Repeat words and phrases from familiar stories. Ask questions about the book. Makes comments and shares their own ideas. Understand the five key concepts about print: -print has meaning - the names of the different parts of a book -print can have different purposes - page sequencing -we read English text from left to right and from top to bottom Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary. Use some of their print and letter knowledge in their early writing. For example: writing a pretend shopping list that starts at the top of the page; writing 'm' for mummy. Write some letters accurately. Activities: Listen to Christmas stories & predict ending. Talk about characters in the stories Join in with repeated refrains Write name on Christmas cards Draw Christmas objects/pictures 	Notice patterns and arrange things in patterns. Recite numbers past 5. Say one number for each item in order: 1,2,3,4,5. Know that the last number reached when counting a small set of objects tells you how many there are in total ('cardinal principle'). Show 'finger numbers' up to 5. Talk about and explore 2D and 3D shapes (for example, circles, rectangles, triangles and cuboids) using informal and mathematical language: 'sides', 'corners', 'straight', 'flat', 'round'. Understand position through words alone – for example, "The bag is under the table," – with no pointing. Discuss routes and locations, using words like 'in front of' and 'behind'. Talk about and identifies the patterns around them. For example: stripes on clothes, designs on rugs and wallpaper. Use informal language like 'pointy', 'spotty', 'blobs', etc. Extend and create ABAB patterns – stick, leaf, stick, leaf. Activities: Follow preposition instruction when placing star & presents on tree Order numbers on Christmas baubles Count Christmas objects Use 2D shapes to create Christmas objects e.g tree, bauble Talk about the 3D shapes of presents Create and identify ABAB patterns using Christmas objects.
